GARDENING TIPS

From Susan -

Did you know that Oklahoma has three growing seasons? As the summer season ends, and the farmers market, brought to you by the community garden, comes to an end, you might think about planning cool season vegetables, such as onions, salad crops, beets or broccoli. Cool season vegetables need cool soil and air temperatures. The cool season greens, such as spinach, lettuce, kale, and Swiss chard, are among the most nutritious vegetables around. Plant seeds in early fall for a harvest well into early winter. Although the community garden is not planting a fall garden this year, we'd love to hear how your garden grows!



Even if you aren't planning a fall garden, soon you will start receiving seed catalogs. Those catalogs always contain a map of the United States showing the various plant hardiness zones, but it can be difficult to determine the zone applicable to our specific area. According to OSU's County Extension Center and the USA Plant Hardiness Zone Map, most of Canadian County falls within Zone 7a (average annual extreme minimum temperature of 0 to 5 degrees Fahrenheit). An area beginning in the middle part of the county, extending southwest, falls within Zone 6b (average annual extreme minimum temperature of -5 to 0 degrees Fahrenheit).
